We can homeschool our children. Being at home with their parents, siblings and grandparents, a kid can learn a lot in the natural process. If we let them do what they want to do with pleasure, with just being present there, as a beholder and caretaker, we can see them do miracles in a natural way.

During this critical period of COVID-19, homeschooling is the best option available for the safety of our child and the community outside.

There is an NGO in Udaipur named Shikshantar, working towards de-schooling for years. Parents from around the world meet and share their experiences of homeschooling there. A parent once said, "I know better when my child is ready to learn something, I can use that moment to teach him effectively, without any formal curriculum, without



any pressure."

The NGO runs an experimental 'Swaraj University', which nurtures 'Swapathgami' (a person treading the self-made path). Children who are homeschooled, after acquiring the basic knowledge by themselves or with the help of their family, select their own subjects of interest, make their own curriculum, and create their own syllabus, with the information and knowledge available around them; and approach the experts of the subjects they want to pursue for further studies. If they wish to study informally, they maintain the teacher-pupil relationship with experts. Otherwise if they find it appropriate, they get themselves enrolled for higher studies.

The 'Swapathgami' learners, creating and following their own path of attaining knowledge and expertise, have become earning professionals of their own field, by pursuing studies of any language, and subjects like Mathematics, Science, Music, Painting, Computers, Film-making, Journalism etc. 'Swapathgamis have become Lecturers, Scientists, Musicians or Music Teachers, Painters or Painting Teachers, IT Professionals, Filmmakers, Journalists etc.


So by being homeschooled, your children, while learning informally, enjoy a full-fledged childhood in a cosy and loving environment; and you get a better chance to develop a healthy bond with them; you can help them in learning and they can help you in household tasks; they become more confident with this holistic learning. They are more equipped and enriched from the knowledge-bank of their family, amid a pleasurable environment of free learning, and with the subjects of their own choice. They eventually get ready for a professional life, to serve the society, and to earn their livelihood with full-fledged capacity.

Roshani Bhadoriya, a 15-year-old girl of Bhind in Madhya Pradesh secured 98.75 per cent marks in her class 10 exams. The resilient girl cycled 24 km every day to reach her school, regardless of the weather conditions. She secured eighth position in the merit list and scored 100 per cent in Mathematics and Science.

She cycled about 60 to 70 days a year to reach the school, and

sometimes her father dropped her on his bike, depending on his availability. After returning from school, she studied seven to eight hours every day.

Making her family and village proud, the teenager said that she wants to become an IAS to bring change in society. The girl's father, a farmer, said he is proud of her achievement and would now arrange a transport facility for her

to go to school.

O.P.S. Bhadoria, former MLA of Mehgaon and Minister of State in the Shivraj Singh Chouhan government, has now announced a prize of Rs 11,000 for Roshani and said she has raised the hope of other girls in the region.

Aelita Andre

Aelita lives in the magical world, which rebels the normal. Her fictitious imagination revolving around stars, planets, unicorns, dinosaurs, flying creatures and a landscape mystically rousing, soothing and captivating creates the essence of her paintings! Giving them an abstract touch, she gives her viewers a limitless chance to read, listen and interact with her art.

Homeschooled, self-taught and inventive, Aelita has earned a name in the field of Painting, while also held solo exhibitions at the World's most affluent and desired museums in locations ranging from New York, Russia, China to Australia, since she was a toddler.

In an exclusive interview with Blub World, the creative genius goes in depth about her love for paints and nature. Read on:

Who is Aelita Andre?

My name is Aelita Andre and I am a 13-year old abstract painter; realistic sketch artist; interactive sound-scape painter; and digital/ipad artist, with a Russian-Australian heritage. I live in Melbourne, Australia. I am mostly known for my abstract acrylic on-canvas paintings and my own invention of 'Sound paintings'. I also add household objects, toys and found objects to the surface of my paintings. I love to create stories on my canvases.

List your five major accomplishments so far?

My five major accomplishments are:

- 1) Starting to professionally paint at nine months of age
- 2) Staging a solo show when I was just two years old
- 3) Having a sellout solo show at the age of four in a top art gallery in New York
- 4) Being invited to hold a solo show at one of the oldest museums in Europe: The Royal Academy of Fine Arts Museum, Russia
- 5) Being awarded winner in the youngest artist category at the Global Child Prodigy Initiative, in India, in 2020

What is Sound Painting? Why violin?

I am the inventor of 'Sound-Paintings' and 'Touch-Sound-Paintings' which are hi-tech paintings, and very special because the canvas has a special hitech surface. When I run my hands over this surface of the painting, it triggers sounds of the cosmos and nature which I have specially recorded for my paintings. And that way I make my paintings come alive through sound by them making all these sounds. Also, I love adding violins to canvases because violins are beautiful and the special scientific theory in physics that says all matter in the universe is made of really tiny microscopic vibrating







strings of energy that are at the heart of all matter in the universe. So for me, the vibrating strings of the violin are an incredibly beautiful and elegant way of visually and artistically representing that scientific theory.

A very important part of my paintings is sound and I have created many 'Sound Paintings' which feature violins and a touch sensitive sound producing painting surface, which when I touch, generates an atmospheric sound-scape.

Describe the feeling a minute before splashing colors on the canvas.

I feel the joy and exhilaration as I am about to make an amazing discovery. Whatever I imagine, I express instantaneously in that moment. The colors I choose directly express my state of mind at the moment.

Colors and music are two very different souls, how did you happen to blend them together?

Colors and music are made for each other. Before I added sound to

my paintings, they were mute, but now they speak and sing. Also, I have Synesthesia, so when I hear a sound I see a specific color and for me the colours create sound, so using technology, I have made audible my synesthetic experience.

Your paintings are filled with cosmos, unicorns, and dinosaurs which depicts your imagination. Before painting, do you re-imagine what you see around, or bring forth what you imagine? How does it really work?

Before I paint, I imagine how my animals will coexist on the canvas and when I actually start painting, things turn out in a spontaneous way that I could not have anticipated, but which is dictated by my imagination, spontaneously in that moment.

I paint abstract paintings and experiment with all different types of acrylic paints and I add violins, toys, dinosaurs, found and household objects to the canvas. I also draw realistic, figurative drawings especially of horses, fantasy creatures and wolves on paper, and I also draw mythical fantasy art on my iPad. To me, my art is a magical world. Each painting is like a puzzle piece made out of a portal into a different universe. Each painting is a window into a much greater world.

From where did you learn the art of making animal sound? How are you further nurturing this talent?

I developed the art of making horse sounds and other animal sounds completely by myself - I taught myself by mimicking all the variety of animal sounds and I constantly practice real animal sounds, so I don't get rusty, and I want to learn to talk to animals by practicing to communicate with them to see their reactions.

What do you like daydreaming about?

I like dreaming about flying over mystical landscapes and amazing creatures that I sketch when I wake up.

Do you like studying? How do you cope up when travelling? I do enjoy studying, I learn Biology, Psychology, Cinema, English, History and Sociology. We cope with travelling because I am homeschooled, so I set the curriculum with my parents about what I will learn. Travelling is also educational, so that is all a part of my learning experience.

Which is your favorite subject and why?

My favorite subject is cinema because I love movies because it combines every aspect of life such as people, psychology, sound, music, scenery, and storytelling. I really enjoy having film discussions about cinema as a unique art-form with acting, storytelling, cinematography, editing, sound-design and music.

What should every teen try at least once in their life?

I think every teen should try skydiving at least once! Actually, seriously, they should also visit the endless red desert in the centre of Australia because it gives such a unique feeling. It is so silent and eerie, yet inviting, majestic and beautiful at the same time.

While you paint, your parents work hard to showcase it to the world. Three things you would want every parent to learn from them.

The three things that I would want every parent to learn from my parents are that they are very encouraging and they treat me equally, and also they support me in all my creative endeavors.

What makes you so fascinated about horses?

Horses are majestic, beautiful, powerful, graceful and intelligent.

Who is your favorite painter?

For me, nature is the ultimate artist and I love her creations, as it inspires me the most.

If you could do anything right now, what would you do?

If I could do anything right now, I would love to travel the world with my paintings and meet children

and artists at my exhibitions to share my art with them and fill people with inspiration to be creative.

Looking at your paintings displayed elsewhere, do you reinterpret them?

When I see my paintings at other locations, especially after longer durations, I interpret them differently: I see new things in my paintings like creatures and fantastic things that I didn't see before. That's actually what I love about my paintings; it is a continual process of discovery.

If you were in a class filled with ten-year old children, how would you entertain them?

I would give children lots of colorful paints to splash it everywhere and be as creative as they possibly can be. The teachers would probably look at me with shock but I would encourage children to express all their energy creatively.

What are some of the best things about nature?

Nature is unique in its landscapes,





and all the creatures on earth are so diverse and visually amazing. We are directly connected to all living creatures and I feel this relationship every time I am around them.

Which new language do you wish to learn, and why?

I would love to learn Japanese because it is so different from English and Russian, which are the other two languages that I know now.

Which three new things did you try in the last summer?

I tried singing, some new varieties of paints, and new painting techniques.

What would you do if you made the rules at home?

If I made the rules at home, I would be able to climb anywhere I wanted to, as high as I like.

Where do you see yourself in

the next five years?

In the next five years, I see myself pursuing singing and exhibiting in major galleries and museums globally.

A talent about yourself you recently discovered.

Singing and writing fantasy stories, which I am developing at the moment.

What is the wackiest thing on your bucket list?

To walk solo and barefoot around the world, with absolute minimum possessions and then going across the ocean all by me, is on my list. I would love to experience this sort of an amazing freedom. And throughout my journey, I would create paintings to capture the spirit of my travels. Also I would love to travel into space.

What message would you like to give to our teen readers?

My message would be to follow your dreams. Never give up and pursue them each day relentlessly. Find what you love and don't stop doing it ever, because each of us only has one life and we must make the most of it and stay true to who we are. Also, the message I would give is that I have seen the beauty of the Great Barrier Reef and I want it to survive, and the Daintree Forest in Northern Queensland, in Australia. And our planet and snowy mountains are so precious. I don't want humans ruining nature. The essence of my painting is about the balance of nature and the universe. I strive to create and represent balance. Each of my paintings is a piece of a giant puzzle, and if you were to put together all of my paintings, it would create a giant jigsaw puzzle of the universe.

To your teen readers, I would say follow your dreams and break the rules!

Education in India: A Topsy-Turvy Pyramid

ducation in India is counter intuitive.

Across the developed world educational opportunities naturally follow a pyramidal structure. It is very easy in such countries for a child to get into a good quality primary school at the age of five or six. And in those countries, the cost of educating a child in a primary school is a fraction of what it would cost to send the child to a university or a technical course such as for a Medical or Engineering degree.

Indeed, most countries have truancy laws that ensure that every child of school going age is in school and punish parents who do not send children to schools.

These policies ensure that there is universal enrollment and retention of children upto the age of compulsory schooling which could be as high as 18 years in many countries.

Most such countries of the world have thus - for many decades now – ensured universal enrollment and retention in schools. Enrollment and retention might become more difficult as a child progresses to the secondary and higher secondary

levels. The degree of difficulty and the barriers for entry and retention increases as a child completes schooling.

In most of these countries there is also a very sound and extensive parallel stream – from the secondary stage onwards - of schools that provide valuable vocational skills, that lead to employment as a young adult. This is

often a very well sought-after stream and in many cases the first preference for a large number of children.

Under-graduation is reserved only for a small percentage of the best coming out of schools. Technical degrees like engineering, medicine etc. and post-graduation

including MBAs etc. are really only for the fewest of the best few.

This system where the degree of difficulty and costs go up as the child progresses through school and college or universities can be best compared to a pyramid, wide and large at the bottom, accommodating all children and growing narrower and narrower for the few at the higher levels of education, at the

> under graduation, postgraduation, technical etc. levels.This is a natural pyramid.

> In India however, the opposite happens. We have built an education system that is an inverted pyramid that stands on its top.

Thus, in India, it is most difficult for a child to gain admission to a quality primary school. Only the rich who can afford to pay very high fees can get their children into a quality primary school. For this, the parent must first invest in an expensive play school, and then an expensive kindergarten, and then onto an expensive pre-primary school. It is only after investing for those expensive 3 or 4 years that at the age of five they can get admission to an expensive private - the preferred name these days being international, global or, in an interesting reversal of meaning, public - schools. Such a child of the rich gets an excellent school education in a quality private school, paying a high financial cost for it, while the overwhelming majority of poor children get filtered out.

Education in our country becomes relatively cheaper after school, at the university and technical levels. Studying in quality

schools the children of the rich can pass through entrance examinations for various post-school degree courses relatively easily.

The comparatively richer students coming out of private schools thus have easier access to the cheaper university and technical education that receive huge government grants and subsidies. With higher grades in school final examinations, and higher ranks in entrance examinations, the more affluent children from private schools get an

advantage over good students of poor families studying in government schools, and secure admission in government subsidized universities, IIMs, IITs, Medical Colleges etc., where quality of the courses are high, but the cost is low.

On the other hand, the children of the poor, unable to pay the huge fees required for a good play school, kindergarten, preschool etc., first goes to a

government run Anganwadi and then to a government school, where teaching and learning hardly exist. By the time a child completes primary the push out and the pullout pressures on him or her to quit schooling and 'help' the family by earning through a job, begin to mount. Apart from abjectly run schools, social pressures increase exponentially as the children progress into the secondary and higher secondary classes. Failures

and dropouts mount. These are especially high for girls.

Only the most steadfast child who begins life in an Anganwadi completes Plus Two and moves to a University.

In India, therefore as the better-off students move out of good schools into universities and technical institutions, the competition becomes relatively far lesser for them, with the good children of the poor having had to drop out at the primary, secondary

or higher secondary school stages.

The ease of entering schools and colleges in the Indian System then is best represented by an inverted pyramid, where it is most difficult for a child to get into the quality primary schools, but as the child progresses up the ladder, the costs as well as the degree of difficulty in enrollment and retention decreases exponentially. Thus the barriers for the children of the poor to make it successfully out

> of school, to avail of the heavily subsidized good much higher than for the children of the rich.

The Indian System thus filters out bright children of the poor at the level of preprimary and primary levels as they have access only to Anganwadis and poorly run government schools, while the rich who are able to invest in the early education of their children find that the ease of entry and retention increases while the cost of education comes down relatively as

the child moves up the education ladder.

This filtration system is supported by a widespread social pact across large swathes of the country that still mostly believes that education is necessary only for the rich and is not really meant for the poor. Large sections of rural and urban northern India believe that education is a waste for children of the poor and especially for girls. Tragically many poor parents themselves – unless convinced otherwise – are a part of this malevolent social pact.

Add to this skewed inverted structure, is the fact that opportunities for skills education for children is all but absent in India. This compounds the problem. But our national abhorrence for skilling and vocational education and for what we contemptuously call blue collar jobs is another story.

India as a society and country is yet to comprehend that the wealth of nations today is not oil and gas, nor forests nor gold or coal, but that the wealth of nations today is human resource, highly educated and skilled citizens.

The day we do, we will provide the best possible quality schools for every single one of our children, especially for our girls.

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Excessive praising does no good to Children

Parenting styles in recent times have been criticized often. For instance, helicopter parenting, over-parenting has created a generation of kids who have a change of pattern in their behavior. Notably, the kids who have been overvalued with too much praising and boasting are the kids who are 'narcissists in the making.' Ohio State University published a paper on 'Origin of Narcissism in Children,' which rightly points at the side-effects of overpraising and appreciation by the parents.

Of course! Feedbacks are necessary, and it encourages the kids

to participate more. But the problem is when the parents do not offer the same support when the kids feel lost, angry or when they lose at the sports or any competition. The appreciation looks as exciting as it sounds but it is not bringing a healthy cycle for growing when it is offered only during the accomplishments.

You are perfect! You are doing incredible at this!' seems fine. But it is not right setting a crazy-high standard when parents say 'you are the only kid who can perform this well' and 'when you can't do it I don't think anyone can do it.' This is the origin of narcissism in kids. The kids

perceive this as the most challenging situation. When they face new challenges or opportunities, they back off thinking they may not meet the expectation. They don't want to risk the failures.

Therefore choosing the right valuing methods for the kids will help them grow in a better environment. Thus too much appreciation can spoil their life.
